
Prof. Ifeoma Okoye (aka Pinky Prof)



Breast Cancer Awareness: The Foot-Soldier Approach in Nigeria

<u>Background:</u> Most cases of breast cancer in Nigeria are late presentations: disfigured and fungated advanced stage diseases which have

very poor prognosis. The age of onset ranges from 25 to 45 years. We aimed to identify the contributing factors to late presentation, to campaign against it and to reduce the proportion.





Our Approach Nigeria is a low income country with moderate literacy of the 150 million population. Using the National Youth Corps members (NYSC), Medical students and Church groups, we created sustained awareness for best breast care practices: SBE, CBE and Mammogaphy, and distributed questionnaires to over 50,000 women in the



<u>Causes of Late Presentation</u>: By sampling more than 50,000 women in both urban and rural communities, we identified ten main factors that contribute to late presentation of breast cancer cases:

- Ignorance
- Fear of unfavourable treatment outcome
- Procrastination
- Social Stigmatization
- Superstitious beliefs and myths
- Cultural practices
- Poor health care system (on average there is one mammography machine per 3 million people)
- Wrong use of herbal remedies and 'spiritual homes'
- Wide urban-rural divide
- Health care cost: the average cost of a mammography is N5000 which is the average monthly earning of most people.

Discussion, Conclusion and Further Work


- Improvement on the health care system requires both infrastructure, technical expertise and public breast care education.
- Dedicated Breast Healthcare Centres should be established in all regional tertiary hospitals.
- We are currently planning to screen 17 LGAs in Enugu State of South East Nigeria targeting the age of 25 years and above.
- It is anticipated that more than 30,000 women would be screened pending financial support and availability of a mobile mammography unit.
- Records from the screening would be used in establishing a Breast Cancer Registry for the state.

	BWS believes non-communicable diseases are preventable and thus focuses primarily on raising awareness of this proven fact among Nigerians at the grassroots level and among the youths and encouraging them to adopt healthy lifestyles and habits that prevent and reduce exposure to risk factors of non-communicable diseases like cancer.
	We hope to achieve an attitudinal impact in up to 99.9% of Nigerians as soon as possible.
	To achieve these, BWS uses community-based education to build a cadre of Cancer Awareness Activists, to search for opportunities to create awareness about cancers to women and men groups and on one-on one bases. BWS also advocates to policy makers and diaspora organizations for the provision of medical services and skill transfer/research to assist tertiary and secondary health care providers to create sustainable cancer resources.
_	We provide advocacy and public education for best breast and cervical practices amongst Nigerian women and men, organizing periodic screening for breast cancer early detection using clinical breast examination and ultrasound; screening for cervical cancer by PAP smear and visual inspection methods, screening for prostate cancer in men, providing a patient navigation system to enable follow up of screen positive patients through diagnosis, treatment and support care.
	BWS recently extended its services to include prevention and early detection of prostate cancer and other non-communicable diseases with shared risk factors such as diabetes, heart diseases and Hepatitis B and C.

Since our inception, BWS has touched the lives of more than 500,000 women, men and youths across Nigeria in real terms-through one-on-one contact, distribution of Information Education and Communication (IEC) materials extensively, developing social media workshops, routine workshops and health talks, training of Youth corp members in 28 States, retraining of Healthcare providers from 31 States, trained medical students from 13 of the 32 medical schools in the country, instigated various cancer and other non-communicable diseases awareness (with shared risk factors as cancer) initiatives across Nigeria.
BWS has established; cancer control collaborations /MOUs with Global Partners/Institutions Multi-center Biomedical Research/Clinical Trials with different UK/American research centres and medical teams, Mayo Clinic, Stanford, University of Pensylvannia, Roswell Park, MD Anderson Cancer Center, Moorehouse, John Hopkins, University of Applied Sciences and Arts, Hannover, Union For International Cancer Control -UICC [Highest Signature to declaring NCDs a Global Priority In 2011, Being a Non-Voting Member of UICC Board] championed successful advocacy to policy makers and opinion moulders resulting in policy structures: ICW, CHF, NHREC, NICRAT, Three-Time Member of 5-Year Cancer Control Plan TWG/ Implementation Many ongoing initiatives and projects all year round in its bid to achieve its mission (See Initiatives to intervene

Many Non-Governmental Agencies (NGOs) have advocated for cancer control through the years; the impact has been felt, yet it is simply insufficient.
Sadly, our brothers and sisters are dying from preventable cases of cancer.
For over 10 years, Breast Without Spot (BWS) has championed the Go Pink Day in several parts of Nigeria on 5th October annually.
The campaign has also garnered international support from both Nigerians and Non-Nigerians abroad.

HEART-WRENCHING STORY - Jessica Pettway (In her own Words)

"Last June, I was having intense vaginal bleeding. And when I say intense, I mean I was literally bleeding out," she shared. "I called around and asked other women if they experienced this before and majority of them said they have. I thought, well maybe this is a 'normal' thing that women go through. I was experiencing extreme fatigue, weakness and just not feeling like myself."

On July 1, 2022, Jessica Pettway's husband, Michael, found her in the bathroom unresponsive. She was rushed to the hospital, where doctors told her the blood loss was because of fibroids. After many more hemorrhaging incidents resulting in hospitalizations and several blood transfusions, Pettway was finally correctly diagnosed with Stage 3, Cervical Cancer in February 2023.

She became a fierce cancer advocate and also shared her healing journey with her followers on social media; highlighting the effects on her struggies, family, her faith and the unconditional love and support she received. She loved life and was determined to beat cancer but sadly she passed away on 11th March 2024; leaving behind a husband and two daughters.

Bavoshiya Gloria Nyan suffered breast cancer, intestinal cancer, liver cancer, and stomach cancer.

Doctors had given up hope after trying their best to cure her. She was eventually told to go home and prepare for death.

She said when she got home, she started preparing for her death and bought the outfit she wanted to be buried in. According to her, she doesn't like the conventional white gown so she opted for a dress she really liked, even though some of her loved ones complained about her choice.

Ms Gloria however noted that she didn't want to die because she has a little girl whom she desperately wants to watch grow. On the other hand, she had already lived for 4 years beyond the time doctors gave her to live, so she resolved to prepare for death.

In 2022, a hospital in **Dubai** reached out to her and told her of a new treatment plan they could try on her, so she obliged their request and flew to Dubai. She said she came back from Dubai with a heart full of gratitude.

A Priest she had told to bury her was having his priestly anniversary, and she decided to attend in the same dress she had told him to bury her in, Ms Gloria has an NGO and has championed and helped others with cancer. Her 14-year cancer survival journey is well documented on Facebook, and she believes God will perfect her healing.

In this seminar I will be addressing the dire cancer survival outcomes in low- and middle-income countries (LMICs), with a particular focus on Sub-Saharan Africa. Cancer survival rates in Sub-Saharan Africa are alarmingly low. According to the World Health Organization, cancer deaths in LMICs account for approximately 70% of global cancer fatalities. In Nigeria, the five-year survival rate for breast cancer, one of the most common cancers, stands at a disheartening 10-30%, compared to over 80% in high-income countries. This stark disparity highlights the urgent need for sustained comprehensive cancer interventions in our region.


Here, I will discuss the pivotal role in the cancer control sphere, of a new software, ONCOSEEK, capable of early detecting 11 types of Cancers! 
